Best in Show

MICHELLE SIDER Evocative Sunset

Stained glass, Italian smalti, iridized glass 2021



The shore along Lake Michigan is a favorite destination for me. Each season brings with it its own beauty and drama. I was inspired to create a piece that evoked heightened emotions and featured the spectacle of weather blowing in over the water. With this in mind, I created "Evocative Sunset". This glass mosaic is a study in reflections and atmospheric effects. The mosaic changes color as light fluctuates throughout the day and dances upon the water and the sky.

"Evocative Sunset" also represents the ways in which nature can reflect our moods, feelings and thoughts. Note the juxtaposition of large and small pieces of glass. I cut vastly different size pieces of glass and used a full range of light to dark shards to express the drama that quickly changing weather over water can evoke.

I hope to transport viewers of this piece to a place near the water's edge, so they may enjoy a moment in time where they feel inspired, stirred and uplifted.

Inspired by memories of gently rocking on a boat during a warm summer's evening as the sun slips low in the sky, I created "Sunset Sailboat".



Thinset substrate, smalti, glass fusions, broken pottery, trading beads

DEB ALDO Impelled to the Art of My Soul


Impeller (cast off metal), marble, 24 carat white gold, pebbles

BETH KLINGHER Turbulent Seas

Broken Pottery, Mexican smalti, stone 2019



My initial inspiration for this piece was broken pottery from a few raku bowls and mugs I had created years ago. The pieces reminded of watching the water off the coast of Amalfi as it swirled and created little jetties breaking against the rocks. Stacking the pieces upon each other, I began to create a series of waves, some calm, some turbulent. I then added other materials — smalti, pottery, cement, and stone-- to connect and reflect the wave patterns and add details and contrast.

LORI MANFRA Wingaersheek Beach


Smalti, slate, ceramic and beads 2021

ERIKA ROBBINS Relaxing Jerusalem Walk


Travertine, recycled glass, glazed ceramic, tumbled glass, agate slices 2021

ANDREA SHAEVITZ I Heart The Ocean


Stained glass, stone, shell 2010



I wanted to create a piece with movement both through the cuts of the glass and through color. The irregular shapes were "sporadically" cut and put together in the way a jigsaw puzzle would be. The colors were purposefully woven through to create the effect of moving from the specific to rocky shore to the middle of the ocean.

ANDREA SHAEVITZ The Flower Quadriptych

Stained glass, Millefiori, beads 2008



The Flower Quadriptych was my first time creating a gradient statement spreading over four different pieces of wood. The sections were purposely created not to sit squarely together, but rather allow the eye of the viewer to piece together the parts to create the whole.
